The Calverton Citizens Association (CCA) Board of Directors is writing this letter to express our deep respect and disappointment regarding the transfer of Corporal Gerald Knight. At our June 6 monthly Board Meeting, we were informed by Corporal James Beasock that Corporal Knight was being transferred from District VI, C.O.P.S. unit to another District VI assignment for community response actions in the Beltsville-Laurel area.

Needless to say, the Board was surprised and disappointed to hear this news. We were under the impression from comments made at the Citizens Advisory Council meeting in mid-May that no transfers were then planned from District VI, C.O.P.S. unit. HIGHLIGHTS OF JUNE 2013 CCA BOARD MEETING

Highlights. The minutes from the March meeting were approved. The CCA will look into buying a tape recorder to help with transcribing the minutes of Board meetings. The Highlights are based on the more detailed minutes.

Treasurer's Report. The Board voted to approve the treasurer's report presented by Treasurer Tom Hickey. Expenses last month were very few; they included newsletter reproduction and associated expenses with starting the Calverton website.

Guests. Three guests attended:

1) Dr. Mukherjee, Montgomery County Executive's Advisory Board. He updated the Board on Lyme disease, what we need to look for and how to prevent it.

2) Corporal Gerald Knight and Corporal James Beasock, Prince George's County Police, District VI. There was an incident on Forest View Drive in which a stolen car from Montgomery County caught fire. The car fire and resulting exploding tires alarmed the neighbors, who thought it might be gunfire. There was no gunfire, and the incident was reported as an auto theft. There have been several vehicle break-ins, one in which the window was broken and two others that were unlocked. Lock your car doors!

Calverton Website. The Website Committee will look into purchasing a scanner for getting articles onto the website. Further discussion indicated there may also be a software solution - CutePDF - that would work. The website is now on Twitter: https://twitter.com/Calverton

To protect the privacy of Calverton residents, only the third person (he, she, they) or the person's first name will be used in the newsletter. The monthly newsletters in pdf format are now being put on the Calverton website, so everyone in the world with Internet can access and see the newsletter. Only public officials' full names will be listed.

Bylaws Committee. There are still some issues that need to be resolved. A couple Bylaws Committee meetings will be needed over the summer. The final draft will be ready for Board review at the September meeting and approval at the October Board meeting. Then it can be distributed for general membership notification at the November General Membership meeting and for approval at the April 2014 General Membership meeting (per the current CCA Bylaws).

CCA Clean Sweeps for Covenant and Code Violations.

- The CCA's sweep of Princé George's County is going well. An Illegal shed has a stop work order and may have to be torn down. Citations have been issued for tall grass, trash, and illegal vehicles.
- The CCA's Montgomery County sweep is a little slower getting started but hopes to have it up and running soon. The CCA Zoning Committee will be reactivated to look at code violations. A systematic way to handle violations of codes and covenants will be set up. First, the CCA will send a letter in writing to inform the resident of the violation, then it will call, and then it may have to contact an attorney.

Signs. Frank C is working with the counties' Departments of Public Works to obtain signs. Some Neighborhood Watch signs are missing, and the CCA is working to get those replaced.

The CCA will send a letter to Montgomery County to

request that the stone Calverton sign on Shanandale Drive be torn down. It is deteriorating and hazardous and is on County property.

School Donations. Both Calverton and Galway Elementary Schools have provided the CCA, at its request, projects for which they need financial help. The CCA will wait until fall to decide because there are a few zoning issues, and the CCA may need the funds for legal advice.

Testimony. The CCA presented testimony at the hearing for the White Oak Science Gateway on May 23. The big concern was traffic congestion.

Facebook Page. There is now a Facebook page for Fairland Communities to keep communities informed about issues and events.

National Night Out. It is Tuesday, August 6, this year all around the country. The Prince George's County Police will hold a big event at District VI station in Beltsville. Montgomery County Police has events in the community and not at the stations.

Farewell.

- Prince George's County CCA Board Member Luiz C is vacating the Board. He and his family are leaving the country for a couple of years. The CCA wishes him well and hope he rejoins the Board when he returns.
- Corporal Gerald Knight, our COPS officer, has been reassigned to the Beltsville-Laurel unit to answer calls for service. The Board members honored him for his dedicated service to Calverton at an appreciation dinner at TJ's. Officer Haynes has been assigned to Calverton.
